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1. FOREWORD

In 2007, the Department of Education began implementing the National Certificate (Vocational) NC(V) programmes in all 50 public Further Education and Training (FET) Colleges. The NC(V) qualification replaces the NATED programmes and is awarded at three levels, namely Levels 2, 3 and 4 on the National Qualification Framework (NQF).

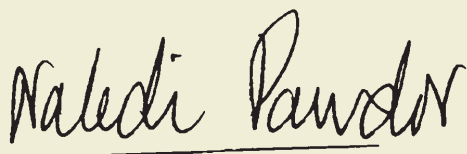
Eleven NC(V) programmes were offered in 2007. Information in respect of the 11 programmes is contained in this booklet. A new programme, Safety in Society was introduced in 2008, is also included in the booklet. In 2009, there will be two additional programmes namely, Education and Development and Mechatronics. Two new subjects have also been added to the Engineering and Related Design programme. The new subjects, Refrigeration and Air-Conditioning, will be offered for the first time in 2009.

The FET Colleges have become first choice institutions for further learning for many young people. In 2007, 25000 students were enrolled for NC(V) programmes. The number increased to 61000 in 2008.

In order to give youth access to FET Colleges, the government has made R600 million available in bursaries to students that are in need of financial assistance and are able to demonstrate potential for academic success.

This booklet provides up-to-date information on the new qualifications and NC(V) programmes offered at FET colleges. It further provides information on bursaries, answers some of the frequently asked questions about the new FET College qualification, sets out possibilities for further study and provides useful information on services and resources relevant to young people.

I encourage young people to take up the opportunities provided at FET Colleges and to use this booklet to guide their choices.

2. INTRODUCING THE NATIONAL CERTIFICATE (VOCATIONAL)

The Department of Education introduced the National Certificate (Vocational) (NC(V)) at public Further Education and Training (FET) Colleges in 2007. The NC(V) offers programmes of study in a variety of vocational fields. The programmes are intended to directly respond to the priority skills demands of the South African economy.

The National Certificate (Vocational) is offered at Levels 2, 3 and 4 of the National Qualifications Framework (NQF). The qualification is designed to provide both theory and practical experience in a particular vocational field. The practical component of the study may be offered in the workplace or in a simulated workplace environment. Students have the opportunity to experience work situations during the period of study.

There are currently 14 vocational programmes on offer. More programmes and subjects will be developed in the future.

In order to facilitate access to the National Certificate (Vocational) qualification, the Department has set aside R600 million over 3 years, i.e. from 2007 to 2009. In 2008, students at Levels 2 and 3 enrolled for NC(V) programmes were offered bursaries through the DoE FET Colleges Bursary Scheme. In 2009, the bursary will be extended to students in Level 4. The National Student Financial Aid Scheme administers the bursaries on behalf of the Department of Education.

2.1 THE STRUCTURE AND COMBINATION OF SUBJECTS FOR NC(V)

The structure and combination of subjects is applicable at every level of study of the qualification, i.e. Levels 2, 3 and 4.

SUBJECTS

Three compulsory subjects:

- Language: This must be one of the official languages of South Africa and should be offered as a language of teaching and learning;
- Mathematics or Mathematical Literacy; and
- Life Orientation.

Four vocational subjects:

These are subjects from the sub-field organisation of the NQF (see the list below).

SUB-FIELD PROGRAMMES OFFERED IN THE QUALIFICATION

The subject combinations in each of these programmes provide a high degree of specialisation for a particular economic sector.

It is important to note that of the vocational subjects, one subject may be chosen from any vocational programme to provide the student with either high levels of specialisation, or the opportunity for broader training.

Generally, the first three vocational subjects listed for each programme are compulsory subjects, and the others are from the pool of optional subjects.

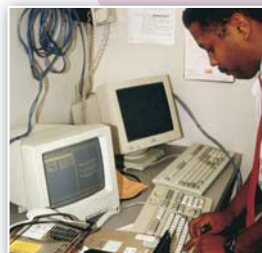

3 FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQS) RELATED TO THE NATIONAL CERTIFICATE (VOCATIONAL) QUALIFICATION

Many questions related to the National Certificate (Vocational) and its implementation have been asked. Here we provide you, the reader with some of those questions and the answers to the questions:

3.1 CURRICULUM

Q3.1.1 How is the qualification different from the school-based National Senior Certificate (NSC)?

A: The ticks in the table below illustrate the key elements common to both qualifications.

Q3.1.2 Why was the curriculum changed? How are these programmes different from the 'old' ones?

A: The "old" NATED programmes, whilst having some merit, did not provide for the development of cognitive skills or for an integrated approach to learning. There was a separation of practical and theory and literacy, numeracy and life skills were not addressed. This in large part contributed to their unrealistically short duration, resulting in speedy certification at the expense of education. Research has demonstrated that

the mere acquisition of practical skills is insufficient to meet the broad economic and specific workplace challenges of the 21st century. Cognitive demands are increasingly placed on workers previously regarded as semi-skilled.

The new programmes are therefore of year-long duration, provide for integrated practical and theoretical learning, as well as compel learners to become competent in analysis and synthesis, reading, writing, logical thinking and problem solving. This is catered for through the Fundamental component, comprising Language, Mathematics/ Mathematical Literacy and Life Orientation.

Q3.1.3 How are the fundamental subjects in the National Certificate (Vocational) different from the National Senior Certificate (NSC)?

A: The overlap in the content for First Additional Language and Maths and Maths Literacy is about 80%. This indicates a significant overlap and was intentionally designed in this way to ensure equivalence in cognitive demand and to promote mobility between the school NSC and the NC(V) college curriculum.

Q3.1.4 Can the language in the National Certificate (Vocational) be any of the other official languages?

A: Yes. All languages are provided for in the NC(V) policy document. Thus far only three languages namely, English, Afrikaans and IsiXhosa have been developed. The other languages will be developed in the sequence of the need conveyed to the Department of Education. The language chosen for the fundamental component must also be the language of learning and teaching (LOLT).

Q3.1.5 Will students who complete a level at school be able to proceed directly into the next level of a college programme?

A: The student may earn credit for those subjects that overlap with the college programme; e.g. the fundamentals, and perhaps one specialist subject from the NC(V) programmes, (such as Tourism or Hospitality Studies). The other subjects in the vocational specialisation of the college programme will have to be completed before going to the next level.

Q3.1.6 Does the NC(V) lead to Higher education?

A: The Department of Education is presently in discussions with Higher Education South Africa (HESA) to have the NC(V) included in the admission requirements for Higher Education.

Q3.1.7 What will the student be qualified to do after 3 years?

A: Students will essentially have the following options:

- Access work opportunities in a work environment or sector relevant to his/her vocational specialisation (such as a bank /insurance company after doing the Financial, Economics & Accounting programme).
- Access the workplace with the occupational specialisation he/she might have opted for through the 4th subject option (such as motor mechanics after opting for Automotive Repair & Maintenance)
- Progress into higher education
- Pursue further training at the same/horizontal level
- Go into self-employment

Q3.1.8 Who will quality assure the practical component of the assessment?

A: Umalusi.

Q3.1.9 Will students be assessed in the workplace?

A: No. However where effective partnerships are in place to make this possible it can be negotiated between the college and the employer and assessment can be conducted in the workplace.

Q3.1.10 Will all Levels (i.e. Levels 2, 3 and 4) of examinations be external?

A: Yes.

Q3.1.11 Will the NQF Levels 2 & 3 papers be marked and moderated internally or externally?

A: The Department of Education: National Examinations and Assessments will manage the marking and moderation process externally for all three levels.

Q3.1.12 Does the 200 hours allocated per subject refer to contact time?

A: This is a good indication of what the contact time should be. This allocation is based on the premise that there are 40 weeks in the academic year. If each subject is given one hour per day then it amounts to 5 hours per week. The 5 hours multiplied by 40 weeks gives a total of 200 hours.

Q3.1.13 Who will provide the certificates at each level?

A: Umalusi. The Department of Education will issue statements of results.

Q3.1.14 Will students who fail have to repeat the full year?

A: Students will not have to repeat all subjects but will have to pass all subjects to receive a certificate. The student may repeat only the failed subjects during the year.

Q3.1.15 Who will teach Life Orientation?

A: Colleges will have to identify and train personnel to teach this subject.

Q3.1.16 Will there be any training for lecturers?

A: The Department will conduct orientation training for lecturers at each level in the year preceding implementation from 2006 to 2008. Training sessions will focus on the learning programmes and assessment. Additional training such as upskilling and reskilling of lecturers to acquire subject expertise or relevant practical exposure must be planned and implemented by the college.

Q3.1.17 Can Colleges continue to offer short courses?

A: Yes. This is encouraged for colleges to be regarded as responsive. However, the Department will not fund these courses. Colleges will therefore have to be funded from other sources.

Q3.1.18 What happens to the N1-N3 courses not covered by the new programmes (e.g. Clothing production, art and design)?

A: These may be offered as SETA accredited occupational programmes.

Q3.1.19 What happens to the N4-N6 programmes?

A: These programmes will be replaced by the Higher Certificate qualification at NQF Level 5. The new qualification will be a broader more cognitively challenging qualification.

Q3.1.20 How will the phasing out of programmes occur?

A: N2, National Intermediate Certificate (NIC) and equivalent are being phased out in 2008.
N3, National Senior Certificate and equivalent will be phased out in 2009.

Q3.1.21 How will artisans be catered for?

A: The Department of Labour has registered four routes to artisan training in Government Gazette, No. 30571 of 14 December 2007. The routes are Apprenticeship, Learnership, Internship/Skills Programme and Recognition of Prior Learning. The NC(V) is one of these routes and is referred to as an Internship route.

Q3.1.22 How did the Department arrive at the identification of the NC(V) priority programmes?

A: The skills reports commissioned by the Department of Labour, SETAs as well as by different research institutions were reviewed. The high demand skills that were identified were clustered into the different sectors of economic activity. The NC(V) programmes are matched against these sectors, namely, Tourism, Finance, Electrical Infrastructure and Construction.

Q3.1.23 Do these programmes respond to the needs of industry?

A: Yes. The various stakeholders were engaged at different stages of the curriculum writing process. These include the SETAs, business, industry, professional bodies and related interest groups. In addition, reference experts were used to review the curriculum content.

Q3.1.24 What can colleges do if they want to offer additional NC(V) programmes that have not been developed?

A: Colleges can apply to the Department of Education via provinces for programmes to be approved for development. These evaluations will take place in September of each year by a panel at the Department.

3.2 FINANCIAL AID/BURSARIES

Q3.2.1 How are the NC(V) programmes funded?

A: They are funded through a programme based funding model that has been developed i.e. the NC(V) Funding Norms. This means that a sum, expressed in rands, will be allocated to a student in a specific vocational programme.

Of the total cost of NC(V) programmes, 80% is subsidised by the Department, and the other 20% is regarded as a sum to be paid by the student, in the form of student fees.

Q3.2.2 Is there financial assistance for students who wish to enrol for NC(V) programmes?

A. Yes. The Department of Education FET College Bursary Scheme assists students enrolled or intending to enrol at FET Colleges for NC(V) programmes but who are unable to fund their studies.

Of the sum indicated as a student fee, students may apply for a part or full-bursary based on the Means Test administered by the college. The college manages the bursary award process.

Q3.2.3 Who is eligible for the FET College Bursary Scheme?

A: You are eligible to apply for a bursary if you are:

- A South African citizen.
- Enrolled or intending to enrol for the NC(V) programmes at any of the 50 public FET colleges in South Africa.
- In need of financial assistance.
- Able to demonstrate potential for academic success.

Q3.2.4 Where can a student apply for a bursary?

At any of the 50 public FET Colleges. When you enrol for NC(V) programmes at the college, you may apply for a bursary.

Q3.2.5 How much money has been allocated for the Department of Education FET College Bursary Scheme?

- A. R600 million has been made available over 3 years starting from 2007. In 2008 the allocation was R200 million for Levels 2 and 3. In 2009 the allocation of R300 million will be allocated to all three levels.

Q3.2.6. Who will administer the bursary fund?

- A. The Department of Education has appointed the National Student Financial Aid Scheme (NSFAS) to administer the fund.

Q3.2.7 Will students who are awarded bursaries have to pay money back after completion of their studies?

- A. No. FET College students do not have to pay the money back as it is a bursary allocation and not a loan.

Q3.2.8 Will the bursary fund cover all eligible students who apply?

- A. No. It is not possible for the bursary to cover all students in the college, due to the limited bursary funding available.

Q3.2.9 What criteria do the college use to allocate bursaries equitably to deserving students?

- A. Allocation of the bursaries is based on the administration of the Means Test. The Means Test determines the bursary amount that could be awarded to a student and eligibility of students for the bursary. Colleges have been trained by the Department of Education, the Provincial Education Departments and NSFAS officials on the requirements and administration of the Means Test.

Q3.2.10 Who takes part in the allocation of bursaries at the FET College?

- A. Colleges are requested to set up a College Bursary Scheme Committee consisting of representatives from:
- Student Support Services
 - Management
 - Finance
 - Administration, and
 - Student Representatives Council.

Q3.2.11 What are the documents that students have to submit when applying for a bursary?

- A. A certified copy of an Identity Document (ID) of the student, proof of income of parent(s)/guardian (e.g. copy of salary/pay slips) and an academic record.

Q3.2.12 If a student has been granted a bursary and does not progress to the next level, is he/she still eligible for a bursary?

- A. No. Students who do not progress in their studies will not be granted a bursary the following year. If he/she repeats the level and passes, he/she may reapply for a bursary.

Q3.2.13 What items does the bursary allocation cover?

- A. The money may be used to cover college tuition fees, accommodation and transport.

Q3.2.14 Will all the students who are awarded bursaries receive the same amount?

- A. Students may receive different amounts of bursary funding, depending on their level of need as indicated through the Means Test and depending on the costs that have to be covered.
