READING SKILLS

We are going to look at different skills that good readers have developed.

1. Skimming

'Skimming' means reading through quickly for the general idea, to see what a book, text or article is about.

Some examples are:

- you can skim through a newspaper by looking at headlines and photo's to get an idea of the main news of the day;
- you can skim a particular article by reading the first paragraph and the beginning of each subsequent paragraph to see if it is of interest to you. If it is, you may want to read it in detail. If you don't have time to read the whole article, you will have a general idea about its subject;
- you can skim the contents page of a text book to see if it is suitable for your purposes.

The process of skimming involves reading samples of the text, a chunk here and there, and then predicting what the rest of the text is about. As you skim the next sample, you may need to correct or adjust your prediction. Each new sample gives you clues as to how the rest of the text will continue.

2 Scanning

'Scanning' means reading through quickly to find something specific that you are looking for.

Some examples are:

- you scan a *telephone directory* to find the name and address and number you want;
- you scan an *index* to find the information you want;
- you scan a *passage* you have already read to locate something that you know is there, and want to reread, but you are not sure exactly where to find it.

3 Recognising main ideas

One of the main skills that good readers develop is the ability to recognize the main ideas in what they read.

- 3.1 Some writers use **signpost** words, which make it easier for the reader. Examples of these are:
- Sometimes we are told: *The main point ...; There are two major reasons ...;*

• *But* and *however* often indicate important contrasts;

• Asking a question can indicate a main point: *Why is ...?*

• A writer may repeat an important idea: *In other words ...*

• Conclusions are usually important and can be indicated by: *therefore; in conclusion, we can conclude; the result.*

3.2 But not all writers signpost their writing. Then you have to use the ideas and words in the text, and the knowledge that you have of the world to decide which are the main points in the text.

3.3 The structure of a text may also help you to identify the main points. We can expect an introduction to a topic in the first paragraph, and a conclusion to it in the last paragraph. Usually each new paragraph introduces a new idea. Knowing this can help you to find the main ideas.

- 4 Following logic
- 4.1 Seeing coherence
- Coherence is the term used to talk about the way in which a text is linked, in which ideas and facts are connected. A good writer writes a coherent piece of work. Seeing how this works, and following the connections is a skill that good readers develop.

- 4.2 Pronoun reference
- What sometimes confuses you and prevents you making sense of something you read is the writer’s use of pronouns.
- Pronouns do not only refer to nouns:
- Peter read the book. He enjoyed it.**
- Pronouns can also refer to phrases and whole ideas:
- The fact that crime is on the increase** in South Africa is largely responsible for the loss of tourism. **This** also explains the loss of income.
- If you do not understand that **This** refers to **The fact that crime is on the increase**, it is not possible to understand *what it is* that explains the loss of income.
- In your reading, you should be alert to pronouns and what has gone before that they could possibly refer to.
- Exercise 7
- In the following text, the pronouns have been underlined. In each case indicate what they refer to.
- One of the main problems in the fight against Aids is the appalling stigma and resulting silence that is found, particularly in rural areas. - 4.3 Ellipsis
- Ellipsis means leaving out words to avoid repetition and clumsiness. When a writer does this, he assumes the reader will be able to understand. You should be able to understand the second sentence below even when the underlined words in italics are missing:

- A skilled reader is aware of which words or phrases have been left out.

- 5 Dealing with unfamiliar words
- In the vocabulary section earlier in this study material, you looked at dealing with unfamiliar words. A skilled reader may well come across words that he or she has never seen before, but will not stop to look them up in the dictionary, and will rather try to make sense of the whole. Stopping in the middle of your reading can make you lose focus and prevent you following the meaning of the whole passage or text. If a word is really important to your understanding, you do need to know what it means. If you can’t work it out from its stem or from the context,

you may have to look it up in a dictionary. When you start reading again, take time to remind yourself where you were in the text.

Exercise 9

Read through the whole of the following paragraph, and then attempt to work out what the underlined words in *italics* mean without looking them up in a dictionary.

A major *illusion* that students have, is that learning results from teaching. The truth is that learning results from *cognitive* effort on the part of individual students. Their *inclination* to sit back in the *expectation* of being filled with knowledge while listening to the lecturer is an *error* often only realized when exam time arrives. 6 Understanding viewpoint

It is important for you as a reader to be able to see what the writer's point of view is. She may, for example, write an article in support of abortion. Another writer may write an article mentioning the religious viewpoint which is against abortion. When you read these two articles, you should be able to compare the different viewpoints on abortion.

It is also important that when you read, you accept that what you are reading may be a point of view and not necessarily fact. You can agree or disagree with it.

Sometimes a writer offers a point of view with which he or she does not agree. Then it becomes important that you see how the writer distances him- or herself from that viewpoint.

Exercise 10

- 1 A bizarre speech by President Mbeki at Fort Hare University has been construed as evidence that he is an Aids dissident. Exercise 10

- 1 The writer distances himself from the point of view of the Wits lawyer by using the phrase 'has been construed' which lets the reader understand that it is not his own opinion, but that of the Wits lawyer. The writer also distances himself from Mbeki's view by calling it a 'stand'. The only clue we have that the writer perhaps agrees with the lawyer is his use of the word 'bizarre' to describe the President's speech.
- 2 This appears to be the writer's own opinion. He calls it 'nightmare scenario' which shows the reader that he is appalled by it. He calls the decrease in student teachers 'incredible', meaning that he finds it hard to believe, and speaks of the trends as 'alarming' which shows that he is afraid for education. He confirms this by ending with a call to do something to solve the problem.
- 3 There is no fact or factual evidence in this paragraph. It is the opinion of the writer. You can argue against it or agree with it. It will depend on your point of view.

ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES

Sustaining our Environment

1. Introduction

Humans influence the environment and use the natural resources, often resulting in destruction of the environment. We need to find solutions to stop planet destruction and sustain the environment and maintain the carrying capacity of the planet. If we do not, food, water and habitats will be destroyed. In order to survive, we must conserve natural resources by using resources economically and prevent wasting what we have. Added to this, we must look to replenishing resources that have been damaged and destroyed or we will impact on the natural distribution of biotic and abiotic factors.

2. Socio-economic environment

- Social Development: ensure that the population has food, health care, clean water, proper sanitation and electricity
- Economic development and growth: food production and export – strong economy and providing jobs and ensure ecological balance – replacing lost resources
- Environmental development and protection: protect natural fauna and flora; manage soil, air and water resources properly; reduce pollution and rehabilitate the environment where necessary

3. Soil rehabilitation

Soil fertility must be maintained. Soil management systems increase plant growth so food production can be increased to meet population growth. The following can be implemented:

Forestation

- Relocate animals which will prevent ecosystem imbalances and extinction
- Recycle paper
- Plant new trees in other areas

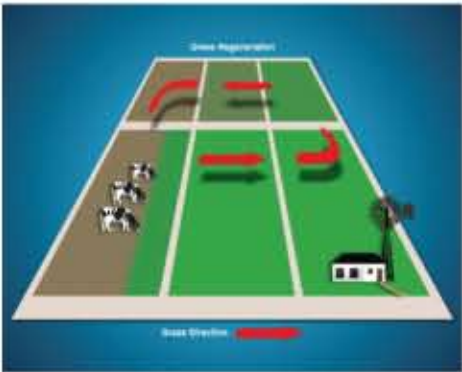
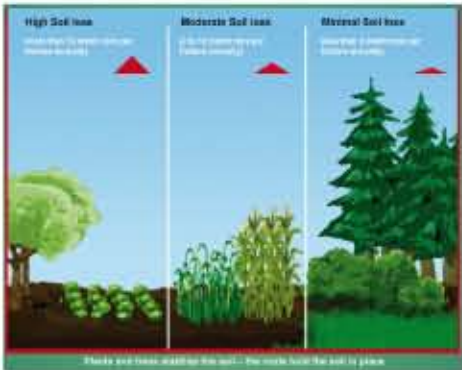
Farming

- Good farming practices like crop rotation, organic manure, strip farming, fallowing and contour farming are needed to ensure soil fertility and increase crop yields.
 - Crop rotation - different crops are planted in the same field each season of the year. Each crop takes different nutrients from the soil and replaces other needed minerals,

- e.g.: leguminous plants like beans and peas increase nitrogen levels in the soil.
- Strip farming involves growing crops in strips in one field. The crops are planted diagonal to the direction of the wind and water run-off. This ensures that soil is blown from one strip but caught by the plants in the next strip preventing soil erosion. The soil washed from one strip ends up in the next.
- Fallowing – a field is not planted for at least one year to allow time to replace minerals in the soil.
- Contour farming prevents soil erosion because crops are planted across slopes in rows or strips. Each strip stops the water from flowing away and washing soil with it.
- Monocultures provide much food in one crop. This has problems like pest, insect and plant parasite populations which will invade an entire crop and destroy it. Pesticides and fungicides must be used carefully to prevent infestation. Natural enemy species can be used instead of pesticides and are far more environmentally friendly. Natural enemies destroy the pests and do not disturb the natural food chains.
- Natural manure and humus should be used to replace lost nutrients. It is natural and inexpensive. Inorganic fertilizers leach nitrates which causes other environmental problems so it is far better to use natural, organic fertilizers.

Soil Erosion

- Plants and trees stabilize the soil – the roots hold the soil in place
- Prevent overgrazing
- Use humus and manure to improve fertility
- Terraces cut into steep slopes to reduce water run-off and silting of rivers



Use humus and manure to improve growth

Mining

- Fossil fuels like coal, oil and natural gas are mined from the soil to provide energy.
- Fossilization takes many years and resources are being depleted.
- We must find ways to reduce the rate at which we are using our natural resources, e.g.: hydro-electricity, wind power, nuclear power, wave/tidal power, solar power

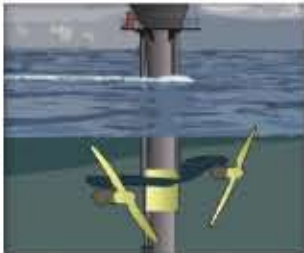

Plastics

- Plastic is non-biodegradable.
- They can be collected and recycled
- Plastic bottles can be washed and reused

Chemical Wastes

- Wastes can be treated to reduce toxicity before dumping
- Ensure that containers are leak-proof
- Dump at regulated dumping sites only
- Maximum fines must be given when regulations are broken
- Culprits must be held accountable for illegal dumping. They must clean up their illegal dumping sites and legal action must be taken against them

4. Water rehabilitation

Industrial Wastes

- Industry is very important to economic growth, but industrial sites produce many waste products.
- Cooling systems must be put into waste water outlets to prevent thermal pollution
- Filtering units must be fitted to outlets to purify waste water before it is released into rivers and streams
- Harmful chemicals like cyanides, lead, copper, mercury and zinc must be removed chemically before water is pumped into natural outlets.

Sewage

- Sewage must be treated before it is released. Treated sewage makes very good organic fertilizer
- Treated sewage reduces the spread of diseases like cholera, typhoid and poliomyelitis
- Untreated sewage causes abnormal algae growth which removes much needed oxygen from the water, resulting in the death of aquatic plant and animal life.

Agricultural wastes

- Prevent the use of artificial insecticides, fungicides and fertilizers and reduce leaching of these substances into the water table
- Introduce natural enemies to control pests and insects
- Make natural fungicides by using non-harmful substances like tobacco leaves, dishwasher and garlic.

Oil Spills

- Oil spills can be prevented by the proper maintenance of oil tankers and regular inspections
- Oil holds must be flushing out at harbours where enzymes can be used to reduce the oil mass

5. Air rehabilitation

Factory emission

- Extractors and stacks must be fitted with air filters to remove carbon dioxide, sulphur dioxide, nitrogen oxide, soot from the air before it is pumped into the atmosphere.
- Emissions must be checked regularly to ensure that they are within Government regulation limits.
- Levy maximum fines on transgressors
- Desulphurization to remove sulphur dioxide to prevent formation of acid rain



Carbon Monoxide emissions

- Car engines must be properly tuned to minimize emissions
- Design and use of electrical and solar engines to replace petrol engines

Conservation of Animal and Plant Life

- Game reserves conserve animal and plant species
- Government legislation is in place to restrict hunting and fishing
- Restrictions are based on breeding seasons, size and numbers.
- Permits are purchased by fishermen and hunters. Should fishing or hunting occur out of season or outside the regulations, then fines are levied.
- Proper law enforcement and high penalties for transgressors will ensure that people work within the laws and regulations which will protect the fauna and flora.

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6. Waste management

Advantages of Recycling

- Reduces amount of waste that must be removed and destroyed
- Resources can be reused
- Recycling results in energy saving as reused objects do not have to be produced from scratch
- Pollution is reduced

Waste Separation

Use separate waste containers for organic waste, glass, plastic and tins in homes. This process requires much discipline and also the collection process must be improved, although this can be expensive.

Waste Incineration

Burn wastes and use energy to power generators to produce electricity which can be used in households. This will reduce the demand on fossil fuels.

Methane production

The organic waste in land fills produces large amounts of methane gas which is highly flammable. Recovery systems can be constructed to collect the methane gas which can then be used to generate electricity and reduce air pollution.

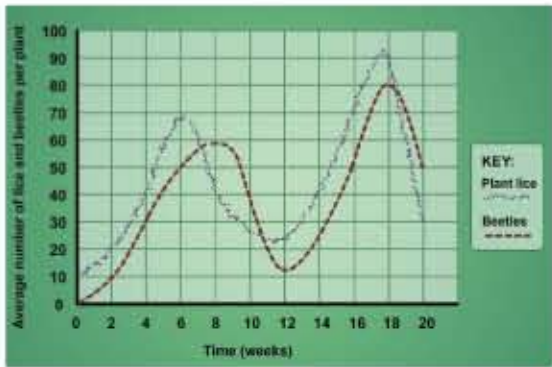

Economics concepts and production possibilities

Notes

The following topics will be dealt with in this lesson:

- The Economic Problem
- Opportunity Cost
- Production Possibility Frontiers

1. The Economic Problem

- What goods and services should an economy produce?
- How should goods and services be produced?
- Who should get the goods and services produced?

Economic problem reveals that:

- People have **unlimited Wants**. You want a TV set today, tomorrow a car.
- Scarce Resources – Land, Labour, Capital. The means or resources to produce your needs and wants are scarce.
- Resource Use – scarce resources have alternative use. With your pocket money (scarce resource) you can choose to save it or spend it on sweets.
- Choices – the process of choosing between two alternatives. Choosing between saving and spending involves a very special cost, i.e. opportunity cost.

2. Opportunity Cost

- Definition – the cost expressed in terms of the next best alternative sacrificed. It is the real cost of choosing one thing not another.
- Helps us view the true cost of decision making
- Implies valuing different choices

3. Production Possibility Frontiers (PPF)

- Show the different combinations of goods and services that can be produced with a given amount of resources
- No 'ideal' point on the curve
- Any point inside the curve – suggests resources are not being utilised efficiently
- Any point outside the curve – not attainable with the current level of resources
- Useful to demonstrate economic growth and opportunity cost

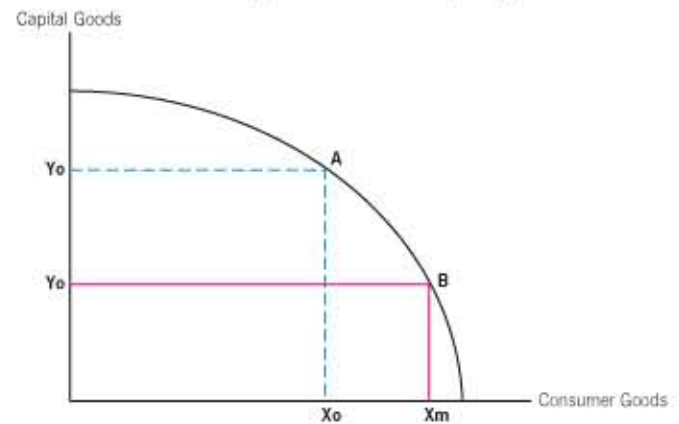
Illustration of Production Possibility by means of a Curve (PPF)

Option 1. The country uses all of its resources

Assume a country can produce two types of goods with its resources – capital goods and consumer goods.

If it devotes all resources to capital goods it could produce a maximum of Y_m . If it devotes all its resources to consumer goods it could produce a maximum of X_m . If the country is at point A on the PPF it can produce the combination of Y_o capital goods and X_o consumer goods.

If it reallocates its resources (moving round the PPF from A to B) it can produce more consumer goods but only at the expense of fewer capital goods. The opportunity cost of producing an extra $X_o - X_1$ consumer goods is $Y_o - Y_1$ capital goods.



NB. The country may have different options. Another option is that the country may not use all of its resources.

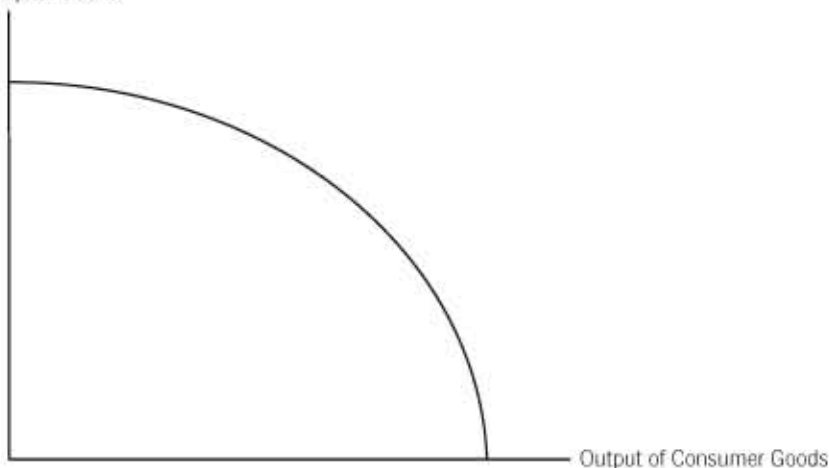

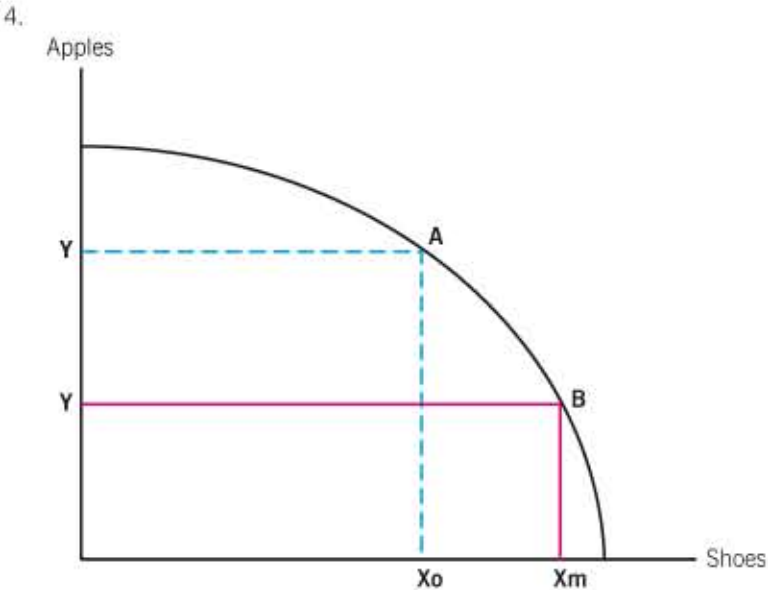

The line that connects points A and B is called a production possibilities frontier (PPF). It represents all of the possible combinations of production possibilities available to the country. If the economy decides that it needs apples and shoes it can choose to produce at any point along the production possibilities curve. If they choose to produce at point C they are making a combination of let's say shoes 3.5 million shoes and 50 million apples. With that in mind, what is the opportunity cost of producing 3.5 million shoes? What did we give up to produce the shoes? We gave up 50 million apples. Opportunity cost is always expressed in terms of what we gave up in order to get something else. In this case we gave up 50 million apples so we could move some resources in to the production of shoes.

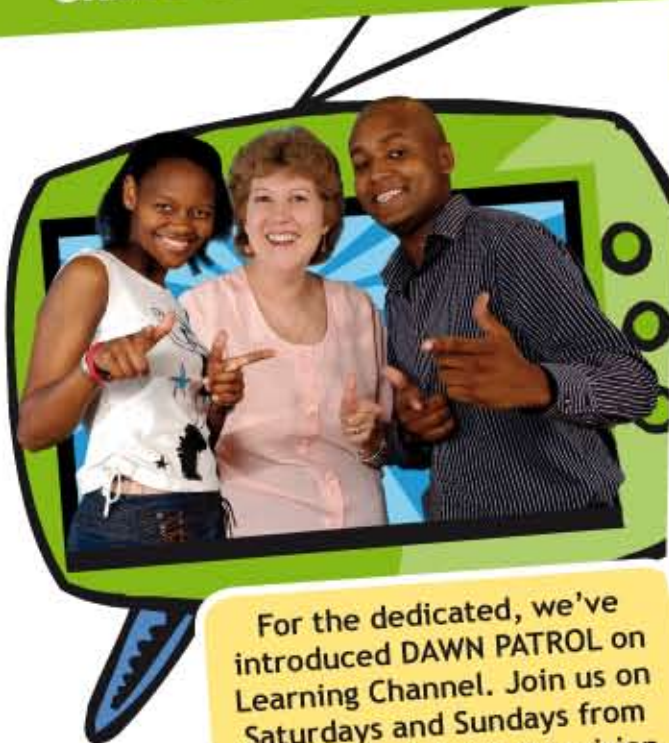

Case Study

Techtical.com - Financial planning

Moloko is a software engineer with a major multinational firm and a highly experienced programmer. He is also a keen racing sailor, and for many years in his spare time he has been developing a piece of software to help racing sailors plan their tactics for a race. The software enables you to input a wide range of variables, including the weather, the tide, and the nature of the course, the boat characteristics and information about the competition. From this you can then develop a strategy for the race. After the race you can input your decisions and test them against what the software considered the optimum strategy. Moloko has used it widely and found it very effective and he has also given copies of it to sailing friends for them to test. They have frequently commented that he should sell it, and he has finally decided to leave his job and set up a company to sell and market the product.

He has decided that the most effective way to distribute it would be through the internet and so he is planning to set up a sales and promotion web site called techtical.com. The software itself will be available through a CD. To make the software more marketable he will need to employ some other programmers and designers.

He is planning to work from home initially and he estimates his initial set-up costs to be as follows:

Software costs - R4, 000.00

E-commerce set-up and hosting - R1, 250.00

Design costs - R950.00

He has allocated R3, 600 for his marketing budget, though he has not yet decided the most appropriate marketing methods to use.

He has investigated carefully to see what other similar products are available and believes he has found a niche in the market, though there are some other sailing simulation packages, but these are mostly game-style ones and not targeted at serious sailors.

He feels that this is a premium product targeted at a small niche and so he is able to set a relatively high price. He has discussed this with sailing friends and it is clear that price is not very important in their decision about whether to buy the product. He is planning therefore to charge R65 for each CD produced.

He expects the variable costs of each unit to be:

R2.50 per CD produced

R5.25 for each manual produced

R2.25 postage/distribution cost

He will be starting to sell the product at the start of March 2008 and expects sales for the first year to be:

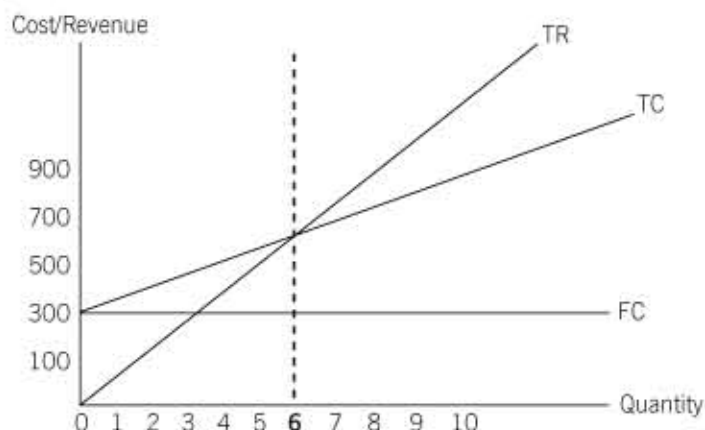

consultation with key stakeholders such as individual employees, their managers/supervisors and staff teams will enable them to understand their contribution to the overall success of the business.
- 3

Activities undertaken by the Administration function

3.1

The administration function ensures that the business establishes systems and Procedures that allow its activities to operate as smoothly as possible.

3.2

The administration function also has an important role to play in ensuring that systems are in place which promote effective and efficient communications throughout the business. Towards this end, the administration function can take the lead in establishing a communications strategy and monitoring its implementation. This will allow the administration function to ensure that systems are in place which support the needs of the other functional areas including:

3.2.1

secretarial and administrative support

3.2.2

production of management reports and other business communications

3.3.3

arranging meetings including the distribution of agenda and minutes.

3.3.4

producing staff newsletters and other methods of communications which provide general information for staff.

3.3

The administration function should also ensure that systems and procedures are controlled and monitored in order to meet the changing needs of the organisation. As such, the function will be responsible for such areas as telecommunications, information technology, security and transport.

3.4

The administration function has an important role to play in ensuring that management information systems generate up-to-date and reliable information for managers. It will therefore be involved in drawing-up plans for the introduction, development and replacement of computer hardware and associated software packages.

3.5

The administration function will also ensure that the business has systems in place to meet its statutory duties and responsibilities including Health and Safety, the production of the Annual Report and any information that may be required by the government including the tax authorities.

4

Recommendations

4.1

South African Airways (SAA) should establish a planning process that clearly identifies its long-term business goals and objectives.

4.2

The planning process should clearly identify the administrative support needs of the business and draw-up an administrative plan that will assist the implementation of the strategic plan.

4.3

The establishment of an Administrative Support Department would be an effective way of ensuring that the administrative plan was implemented.

Marketing includes the following activities:

- Product – advice on new product, development, product improvement, extension strategies and target markets.
- Promotion and communication strategies
- Pricing of product
- Market research
- Sales strategies
- The sales team

Task 1

Read the scenario below and answer the questions that follow.

South African Agriculture exports specialises in the shipping of foodstuffs throughout the world. The organisation is concerned about the recent poor publicity regarding the safety of certain foods and how this adverse publicity will impact upon their businesses.

Draw up a briefing sheet for South African Agriculture exports showing clearly:

- (a) the possible impact on the farming industry due to changes in market conditions
- (b) how the marketing mix could be used to influence the level of consumer demand.

demand in the global market. The forum may offer special discounts on the distribution of other products in order to stimulate market demand. This may include giving discounts for bulk orders and special rates for repeat contracts.

- 2 Organise publicity campaigns to alleviate consumer concerns over the safety of foodstuffs. For example, South African Agriculture exports could issue press releases and organise special promotions at trade fairs.
- 3 Engage in a dialogue with the Government in order to obtain their support for the campaign. The Government has important economic and political links with international organisations throughout the world that it could use to influence the policies of other countries towards alleviating the concerns over food safety.
- 4 Promote business networking activities with other organisations facing similar problems (farmers, suppliers, manufacturers, and distributors) in order that these activities can be co-ordinated on a national/international basis. Such networking activities could involve identifying new markets on the basis of in-depth market research, mounting a vigorous advertising campaign which emphasises the quality and brand image of the foodstuffs and organising targeted marketing activities on the basis of disposable income and market segmentation.
- 5 A network of organisations could also employ specialist food scientists who may be able to provide technical advice and research that identifies the safety of foodstuffs in the face of consumer fears.

Note:

This topic will provide you with the opportunity to show your understanding of the workings of the market in a practical setting and the second part of the question will enable you to describe in detail the role and importance of the marketing mix.

SOLUTION

- A (ii) Prices in a competitive market are determined by demand and supply. Changes in the conditions of demand will influence the price of a particular product, in this case the specific foodstuffs that have been the subject of safety concerns.
- (iii) In such circumstances the actions of consumers will serve to reduce demand **regardless of the price** and such an action will result in lower market prices for the foodstuffs in question.
- (iv) A reduction in market demand results in less foodstuffs being shipped by the organisation leading to less business and a reduction in turnover.
- (v) Less business also results in lower profit margins and the organisation may need to instigate efficiency savings in order to maintain profit levels. They might choose to consider reducing labour cost that may result in possible redundancies.
- (vi) South African Agriculture exports may also come under pressure from the food producers (farmers) as they too see their profit margins fall. As a result, they may seek to persuade the government to reduce their contract costs for shipping the foodstuffs, thereby putting greater pressure on profit margins.
- (vii) South African Agriculture exports and farmers may consider re-structuring their business activities in order to switch to more profitable areas of business activity.
- B (i) Successful marketing involves a combination, or 'mix', of 4 critical elements:
- price
 - product
 - promotion
 - place
- (ii) Commonly referred to as 'the 4 p's', the marketing mix is used by business organisations as a management tool to monitor market conditions and adapt their marketing strategy in such a way as to meet sales targets.
- (iii) South African Agriculture exports and the producers of the foodstuffs in question, can use the components of the marketing mix to influence market demand in a number of ways:
- 1 Reduce price to increase demand. South African Agriculture exports is not a direct producer or manufacturer of foodstuffs. The impact of 'food scares' will therefore have an indirect impact on its business due to the reduction in volume of specific foodstuffs

Catch a wake up

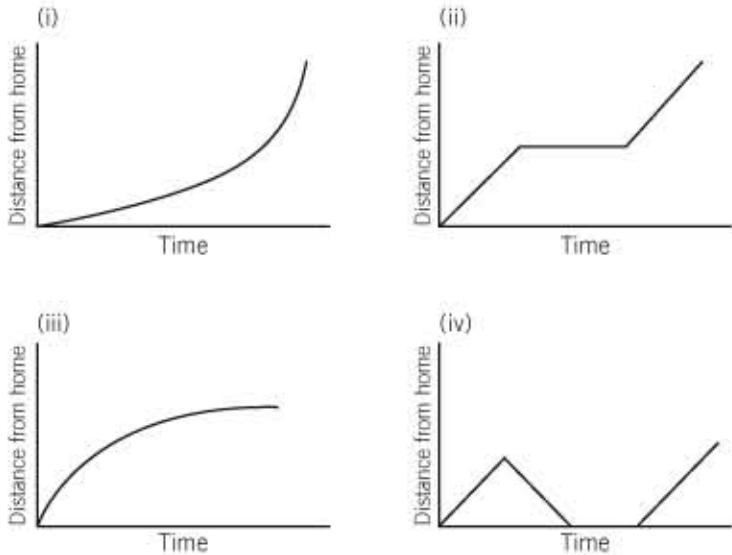

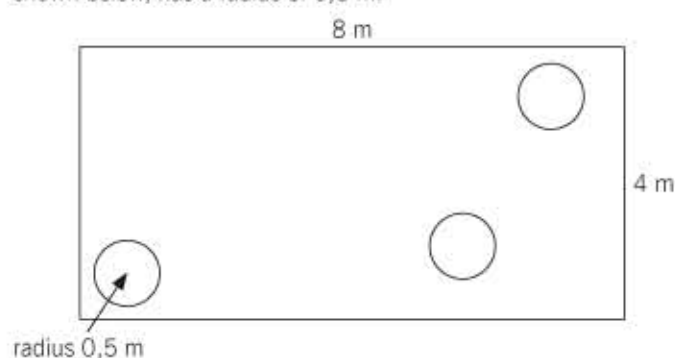
