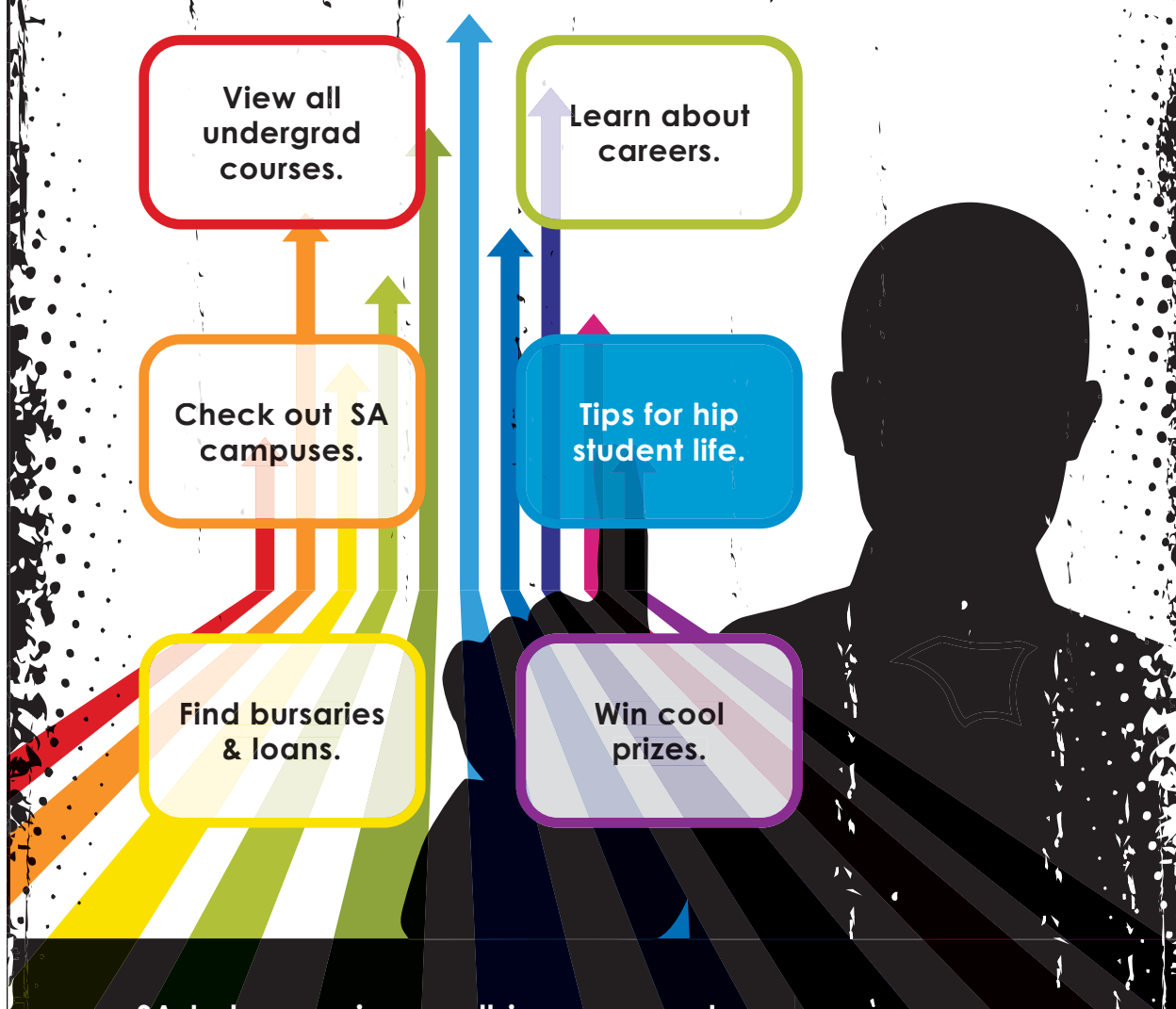

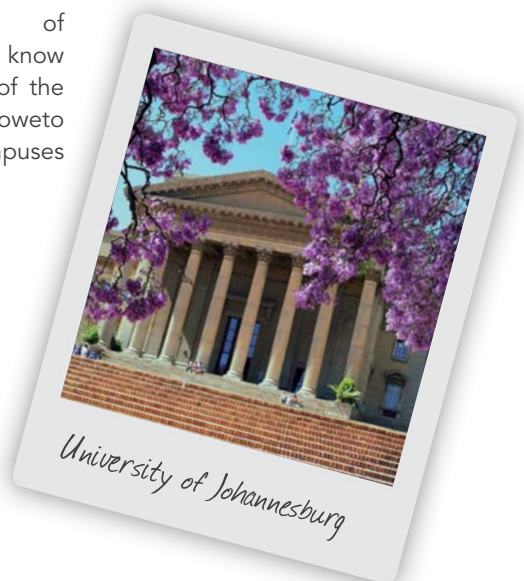
The University of Johannesburg's logo has two birds coming together and embracing an open book. This is representative of the union of two respected learning institutions into a powerful new entity.

LOVING ME

With a healthy self-esteem, you'll feel happier, enjoy better relationships and be more likely to achieve your goals.

Having a low self-esteem is not cool and can negatively affect your life. But, let's face it – sometimes the way you feel about yourself can take a real knock. Rebecca Mamabolo, from loveLife's call centre, describes self-esteem as how you view yourself: "A high self-esteem means you believe in yourself and value yourself, while a low self-esteem means you don't."

The problem with low self-esteem is that it can lead you to doing negative things, like taking drugs or having unprotected sex. "If your self-esteem is low, you won't care so much about taking good care of yourself by exercising and eating healthily either," says Mamabolo. "With a low self-esteem, you're also more likely to get into abusive relationships, which can leave you feeling lonely and sad. You're also less likely to leave a cheating partner who could give you HIV."

Mamabolo adds that having a low self-esteem may cause you to choose the wrong career because you don't trust your own decisions, and feel it's better to just follow whatever course, diploma or degree your friends are doing. "It's also harder for you to achieve your goals if you don't feel good about yourself," she says. So, remember to respect yourself so others can do the same!



3 steps to boost your self-esteem:

1. Be confident about your background. Whether you come from a poor or rich family, be proud of where you come from. But, remember: you're not defined by your zip code. Only YOU have the power to dictate where you go in life.
2. Surround yourself with positive, loving people who treat you with the respect you deserve. If you hang around people who are always negative and put you down, you'll start believing what they say and this could dent your precious self-esteem.
3. Everyone has potential. Just because you struggle with Maths or Science, doesn't mean there is nothing you're good at. There will always be something that'll make you shine. Think about your positive qualities if you want to raise your self-esteem. Write a list of 20 things you like about yourself (your friends and family can add to the list too). Look at the list often, especially when you need a boost, and Make YOUR Move to be the best you can be.

Finding the talented people we need and addressing the long-standing skills shortage in the financial services industry in South Africa is the aim of the Banking Skills Academy (BSA) which was created by the PBB Learning and Development within Standard Bank in 2008. The BSA is a virtual academy which will, in time, host a number of Standard Bank specific learnership programmes aimed at unemployed youth.



STANDARD BANK BANKING SKILLS ACADEMY

ABOUT THE PROGRAMME

The skills development opportunity, in the form of the BSA, is a 12-month national learnership programme for unemployed matriculants and graduates, under the age of 30 years. It is an integrated training programme to help inexperienced job seekers to start a career in the financial services industry. It consists of e-learning modules, self study assignments and facilitator led training sessions on topics like:

- Banking Fundamentals;
- Communication Skills;
- Numeracy and Literacy;
- The financial services regulatory landscape;
- Personal effectiveness;
- Basic credit and investment principles;
- Customer service skills: and
- Banking roles (referred to as role-based curricula, e.g. Tellers Enquiries, Cash Centre, etc)

Besides training, learners are also exposed to real life working environments with the purpose to apply their learning in a workplace setting (like the branch) with the guidance of a workplace coach. Learners are also required to complete workplace assignments and assessments to prove that learning has taken place.

At the end of the learnership, that's in month 13, the hard work and effort of competent learners are celebrated at a graduation ceremony where learners are awarded a National Certificate in Banking. This means that when the 12 month contractual obligation expires with the bank, the learners can seek employment with any employers in the economy.

Intake of new learners occurs at certain intervals during the year and does not necessarily happen at the beginning of each year. Invites to join the learnership are posted with recruitment agencies and advertisements in local newspapers.

A learnership is a vocational education and training programme to facilitate the linkage between structured learning and work experience in order to obtain a registered qualification. It combines theory and workplace practice into a qualification that is registered on the NQF (National Qualifications Framework)

A person who successfully completes a learnership will have a qualification that signals occupational competence and which is recognised throughout the country. Learnerships are offered by corporations such as Standard Bank.

DURATION

Learnerships have a flexible duration and may vary from company to company. Learnerships can take as long as couple of weeks to more than one year.

WHAT IS A CERTIFICATE?

This is an entry-level higher education qualification. The qualification is primarily vocational, or industry oriented. The qualification also serves to provide students with the basic introductory knowledge, cognitive and conceptual tools and practical techniques for further higher education studies in their chosen field of study.

The knowledge emphasises general principles and application. This qualification signifies that the student has attained a basic level of higher education knowledge and competence in a particular field or occupation and is capable of applying such knowledge and competence in an occupation or role in the workplace.

Certificates may have a duration of 1 to 2 years, and the National Certificate Vocational has a duration of 3 years - which is a practical alternative to the National Senior Certificate.

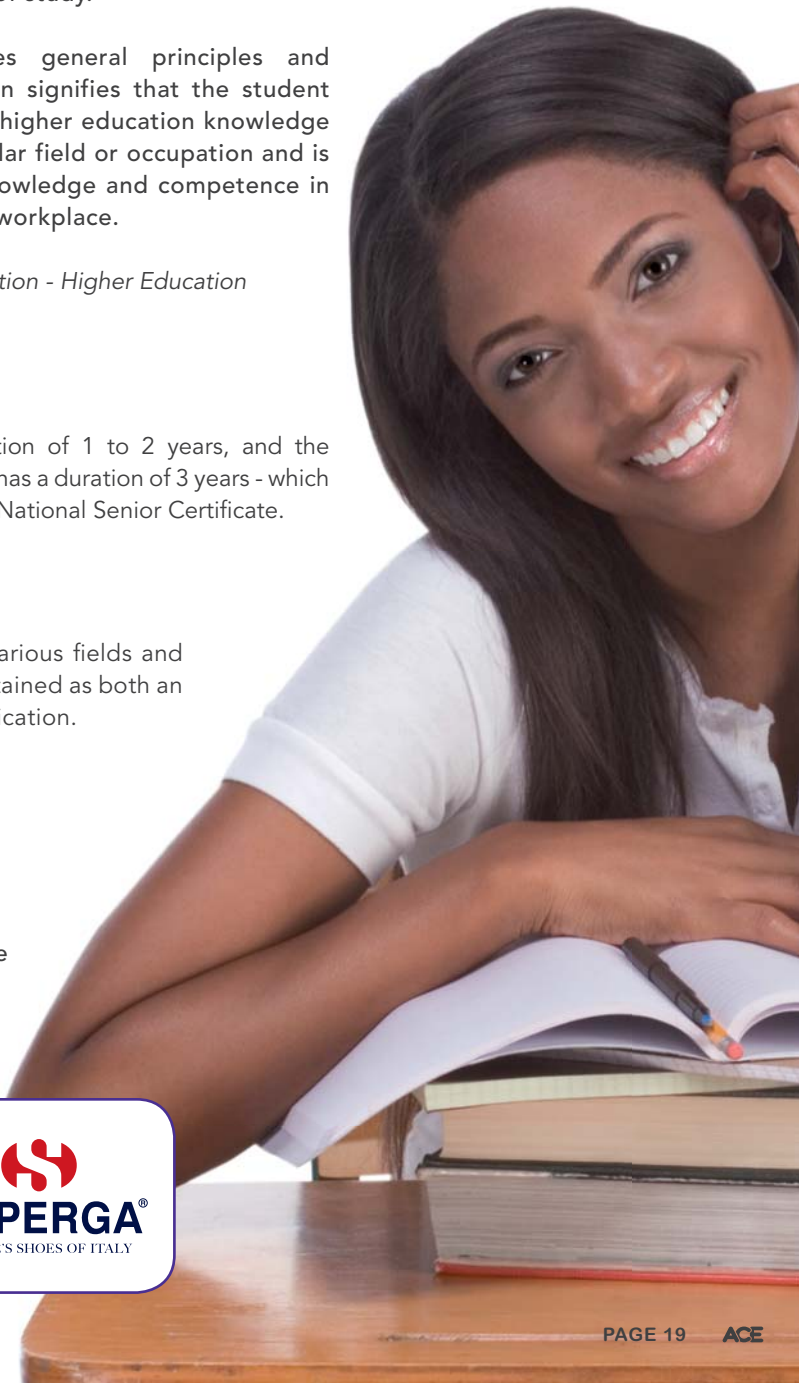

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WHAT IS A DIPLOMA?

This qualification is primarily professional, vocational or industry specific. The knowledge emphasises general principles and application.

The purpose of the Diploma is to develop graduates who can demonstrate focused knowledge and skills in a particular field. Typically they will have gained experience in applying such knowledge and skills in a workplace context.

A depth and specialisation of knowledge, together with practical skills and experience in the workplace, enable successful students to enter a number of career paths and to apply their learning to particular employment contexts from the outset.

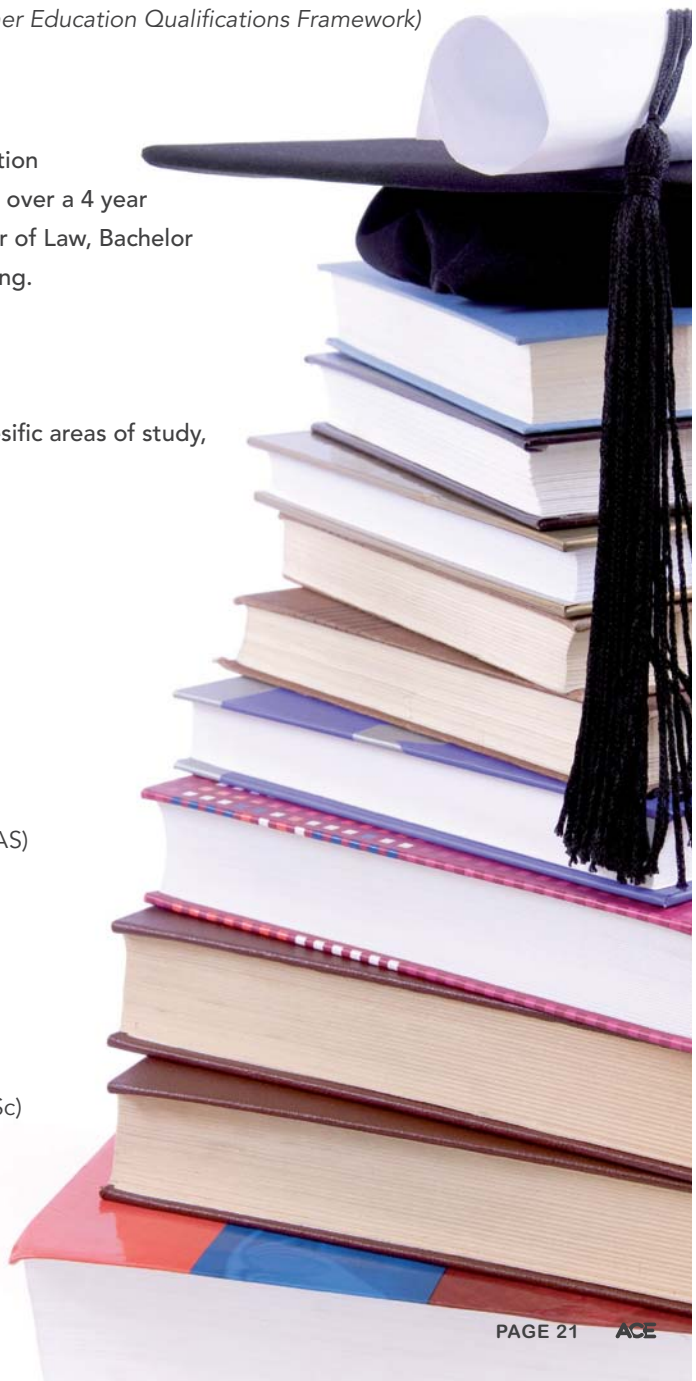

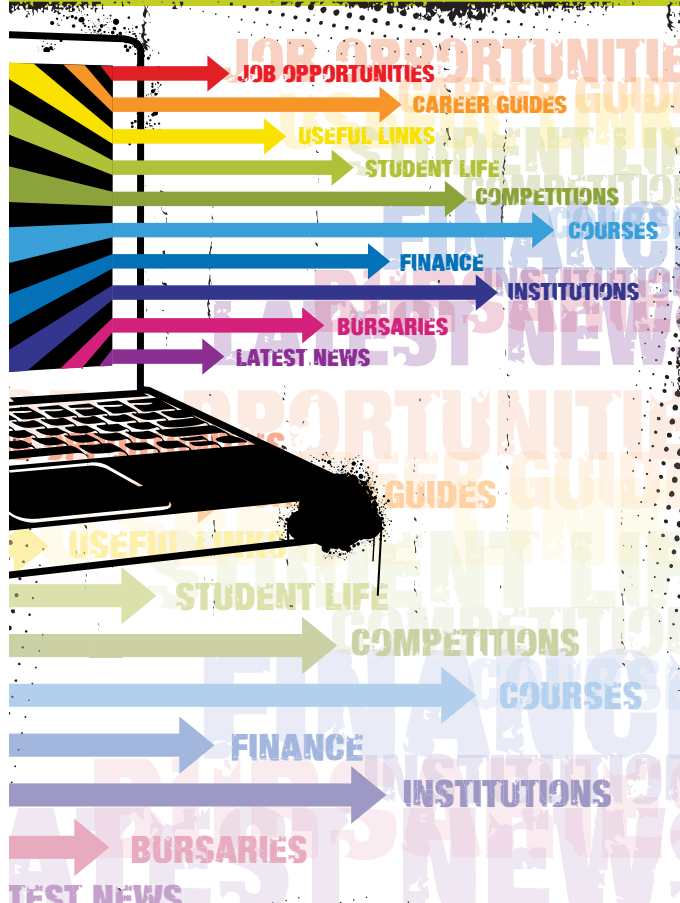

A LOAN IN THE DARK

So, you have decided what you want to study and where but have no idea how you are going to fund your studies? The universe has made provisions for those in your position and it is called a student loan.

Here is a list of things you need to apply for a student loan at any bank:

- Proof of registration at an educational institute;
- Copy of your id;
- A parent or guardian to sign as surety;
- Copy of their id, 3 months bank statements and payslip;
- Your latest exam results;
- Proof of residence;
- Proof of your varsity costs.

5 THINGS TO CONSIDER BEFORE ACCEPTING A LOAN

Borrowing money to finance your studies is a good option and here are 5 things to consider before signing on the dotted line:

1. **Type of loan:** View the pros and cons of different loans.
2. **Your Credit Score:** This determines if you are eligible to obtain a loan.

FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS

There are many ways to finance your studies and a financial institution is the way forward. Before you pay a visit to your local bank offices, talk to your education institution about bursaries and student loans. They will be able to provide you with ample information that may assist you with funding. Banks are a quick and easy way to have access to funds without waiting a substantial amount of time before you are endorsed with the funds you require to complete your degree.

To apply for financial aid you must be registered or have a letter to prove that you are accepted as a student at an institution, you need your identity document and your previous results. In order to process the application the financial institution also requires that you have a surety for the loan. Your surety can be your parent or guardian and must provide his or her proof of residence, income, bank statements and identity. When the latter is received the financial institution is able to determine the amount of finance you qualify for and the terms and conditions of the repayment of the amount borrowed.

PERSONAL LOANS OR STUDENT LOANS?

Financial institutions can provide two kinds of loans to help solve your tuition problem.

PERSONAL LOANS

A personal loan is a transaction between you and a financial institution and the first repayment is the month after you receive the funding from the bank. A loan term can be arranged that suits you best. This can be anything from 12 months to 5 years or more.

STUDENT LOANS

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WHAT IS A BURSARY?

A bursary is a monetary contribution by an institution to further the applicant's education. There are two types of bursaries: a student bursary and a company bursary.

Student bursaries are provided to students with either high academic achievements or based on their financial need. In the case of company bursaries, the student is expected to work for the company once they graduate to "repay" the bursary awarded to them.

How to apply for a bursary?

Applying for a bursary is similar to applying for a loan at a financial institution. You need to have proof of registration, residence, costs and identity.

Bursary applications can take up to three months to process. The outcome of the application will be posted to the applicant.

HINT:

Attach a motivational letter with your application stating your current situation and motivation for studying further.

How to search for a bursary?

If you have registered at an institution, then why not make use of their Bursaries and Loans Department? They should have information on bursary providers. Talk to them and see if anything matches your criteria.

Another option is to do an internet search on all the bursaries and financial aid options available. Do remember to read and understand the terms and conditions clause for all the options you are interested in, to avoid this being a determining factor later down the line.

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FUNDING FOR STUDIES ADMINISTERED BY NSFAS



The National Student Financial Aid Scheme (NSFAS) is a Government agency that administers funds to assist South African students to pay for their tertiary studies. We offer loans and bursaries for first undergraduate degrees at South African public Universities and Universities of Technology, as well as bursaries for the National Certificate (Vocational) at public Further Education & Training (FET) Colleges. (We are unable to fund studies at private institutions.)

Most students we assist receive money for their studies by way of low-interest loans. These loans (capital and interest) are repayable as soon as the student begins to work and earns more than R30 000 per year. The parents of the student are not responsible for repaying the loan.

Bursaries for specific fields of study are also available, e.g. the Funza Lushaka Bursary for teaching (certain teaching subjects only), bursaries for social

work studies, as well as bursaries for various scarce skills such as engineering, IT, and so on. (If you wish to become a teacher, you may qualify for the Funza Lushaka bursary. You can obtain more information about the bursary from the relevant website – www.funzalushaka.doe.gov.za – or from the University Financial Aid Office. Applications for the bursary may be done online. Bursaries are also available for studying social work, and you can obtain further information from your regional Department of Social Development office or the University Financial Aid Office.)

For FET Colleges, the financial assistance available through NSFAS is a bursary for studying a National Certificate (Vocational).

FUNDING FOR STUDIES ADMINISTERED BY NSFAS



The process for accessing financial assistance is as follows:

- First apply for academic acceptance at a public University or FET College. Most universities close their applications by about September or October of the previous year, and it is best to use either the end-of-year Grade 11 results or the June Grade 12 results to apply for a place at a university.
- Apply for financial assistance at the University's Financial Aid Office or the Student Support Centre at an FET College. The Financial Aid Office handles a variety of different types of financial assistance – scholarships, bursaries and loans. At most universities, the bulk of the money available for student funding is money administered by the National Student Financial Aid Scheme.
- Take along your South African barcoded ID, proof of household income (such as, salary or pension slips for your parents/legal guardians, or a sworn Affidavit confirming that the household has no form of income), and a list of the names of other members of your household who are studying or at school, as well as certified copies of their IDs.

Applications for funding are not dealt with by NSFAS directly, so you need to contact the Financial Aid Office or FET College Student Support Centre concerning anything relating to your application.

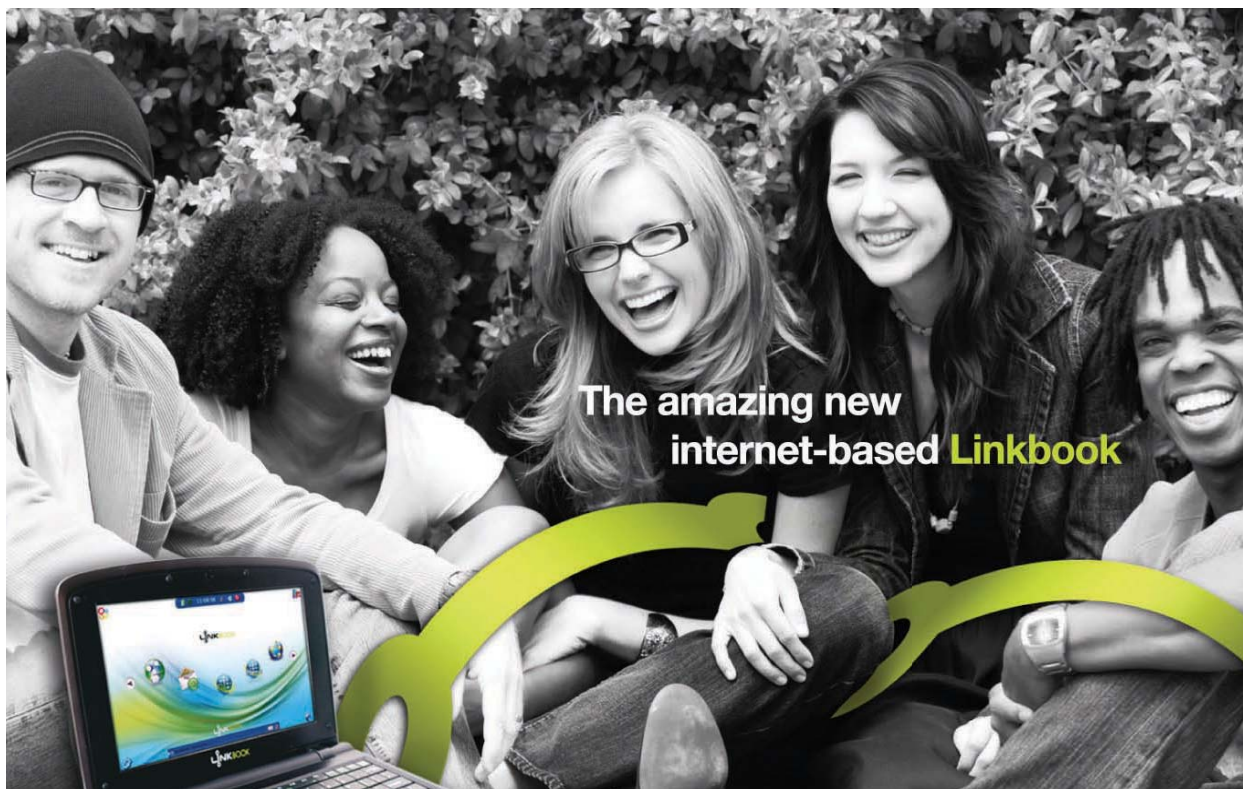

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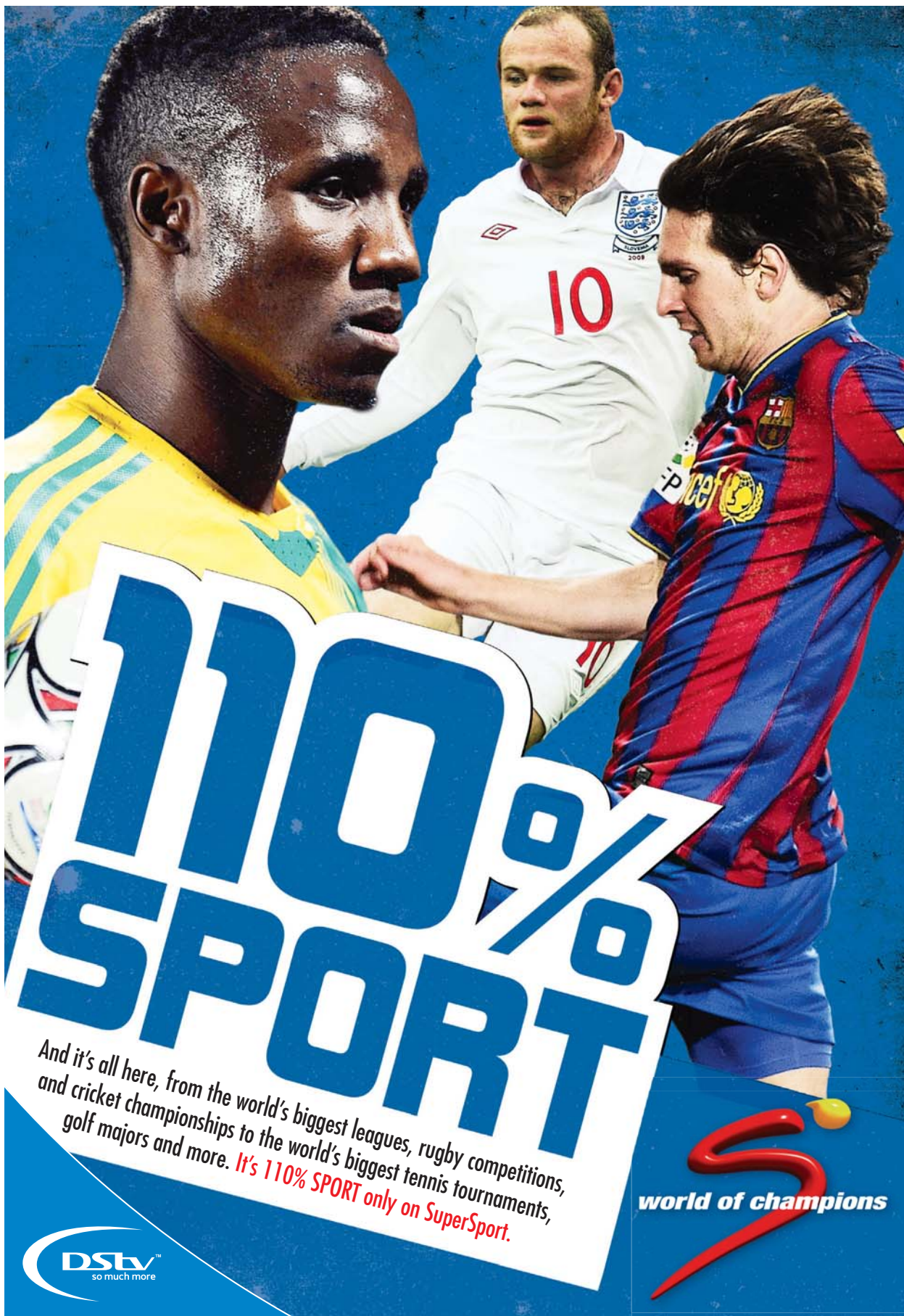

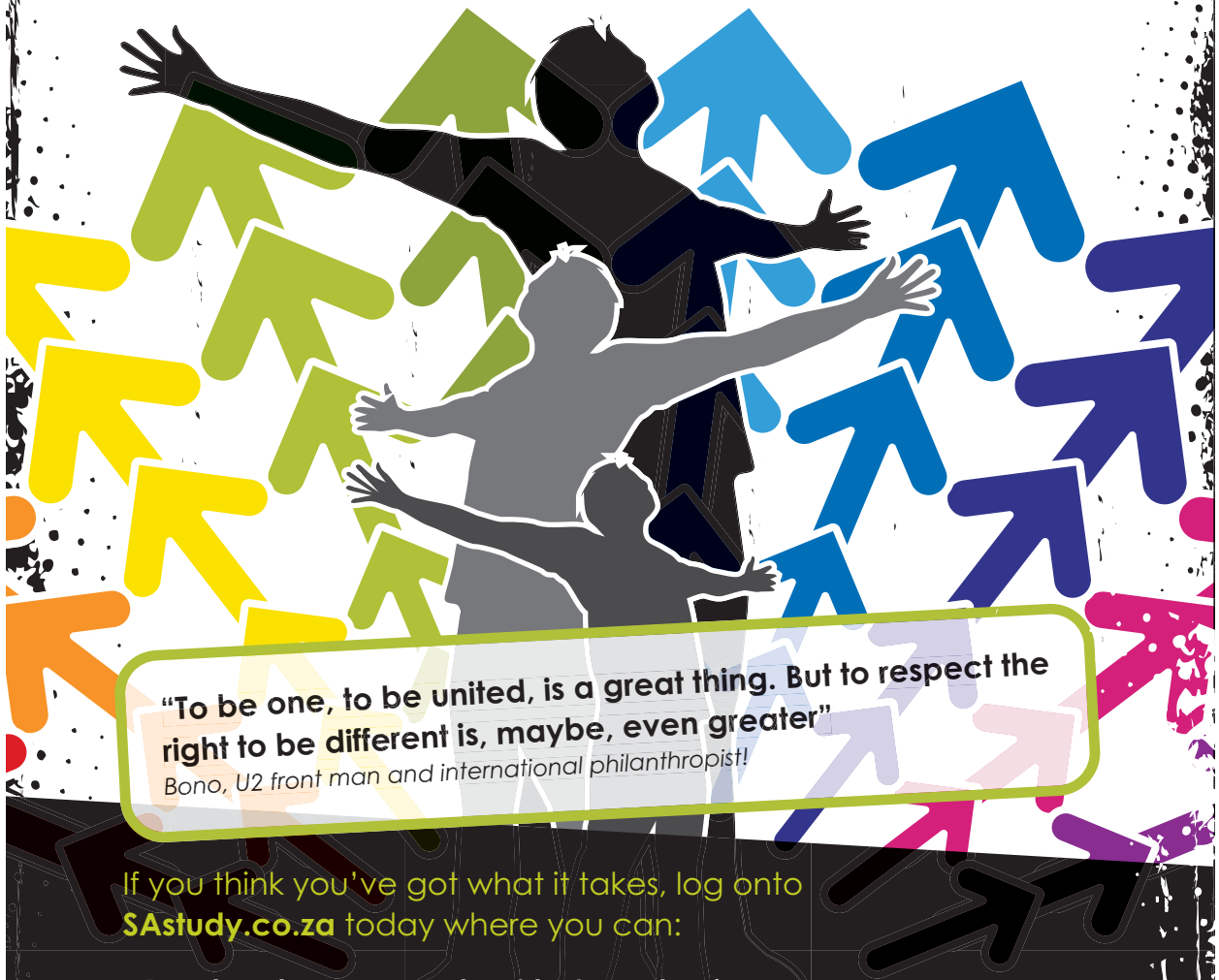

My life pretty much started at the age of nine, when I first discovered swimming. If I had to pinpoint when my love for it started, it would be the feeling of belonging I felt when swimming.

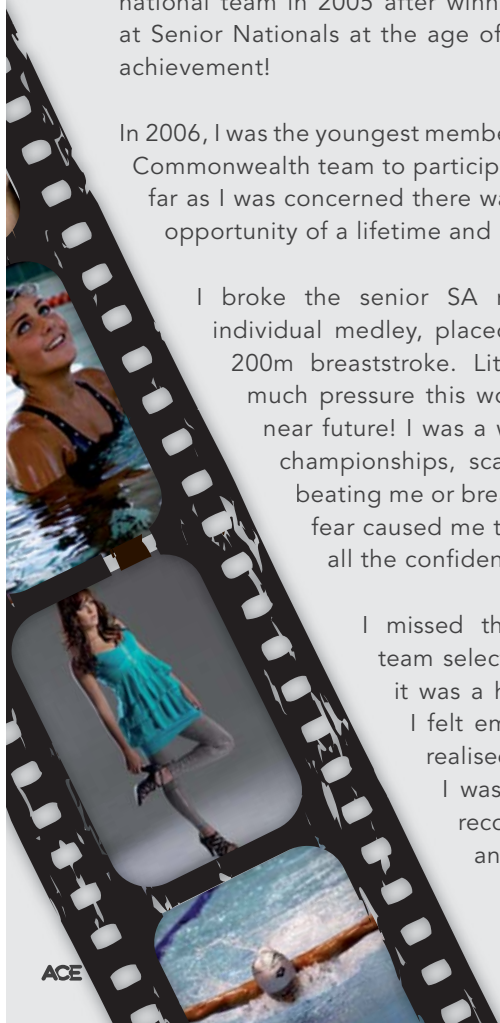
In 1999, at the age of nine, I won the SA Schools Gala. I knew that it was the start of something that would last a lifetime! 11 years later, it still is a major part of my life!

Disappointments were a certainty, even at a very young age. My parents always encouraged me. I made the national team in 2005 after winning silver and bronze at Senior Nationals at the age of 14. This was a huge achievement!

In 2006, I was the youngest member of the South African Commonwealth team to participate in Melbourne. As far as I was concerned there was no pressure, it's an opportunity of a lifetime and I should enjoy it!

I broke the senior SA record in the 200m individual medley, placed 6th and 7th in the 200m breaststroke. Little did I know how much pressure this would cause me in the near future! I was a wreck in the next few championships, scared of any swimmer beating me or breaking my record. That fear caused me to lose myself, to lose all the confidence I had in myself!

I missed the following national team selection. Needless to say, it was a huge disappointment. I felt embarrassed and sad. I realised how much pressure I was facing, being an SA record holder and sister of an Olympic champion.

In 2007, the year I matriculated, I decided to focus more on my academics and matriculated with four distinctions. In 2008 I travelled to Bath in the UK and swam well, things were looking up for the Olympic Trials in April. That was when the first blow hit me, I fell very ill in the last two weeks of my stay and was diagnosed with measles. I couldn't finish the trials and as a result, did not make it to the Beijing Olympic Games.

I was crushed, but ready to fight back! In 2009 I fell ill again. After many medical tests, I was diagnosed with Glandular Fever. I was ordered to stay out of the water for 2 months! On top of it, I strained my ankle and had to wear a cast for six weeks after trying to master three ball room dance sequences for a fundraiser. It felt as if my world was tumbling down at a very fast rate!

My brother granted me the opportunity to live with him in Pretoria whilst training with his swimming squad. Things were finally looking up for me! In 2010, I started my own swimwear range called JMN Swimwear and started my LLB Degree through the University of the Free State! In April this year, I swam at the nationals and for the first time since 2006, I was in the race again! I can't even describe the joy after completing the 200m Breaststroke! I won silver and gold after only four months of training. Adding to my blessings, I was chosen as the face and spokesperson of the Nimue skincare range.

It is hard to believe, when looking back at my journey, that I have endured so much and received so many blessings, gained the world and lost it all again. I am still going strong with enthusiasm and passion, simply because I know the best is yet to come!

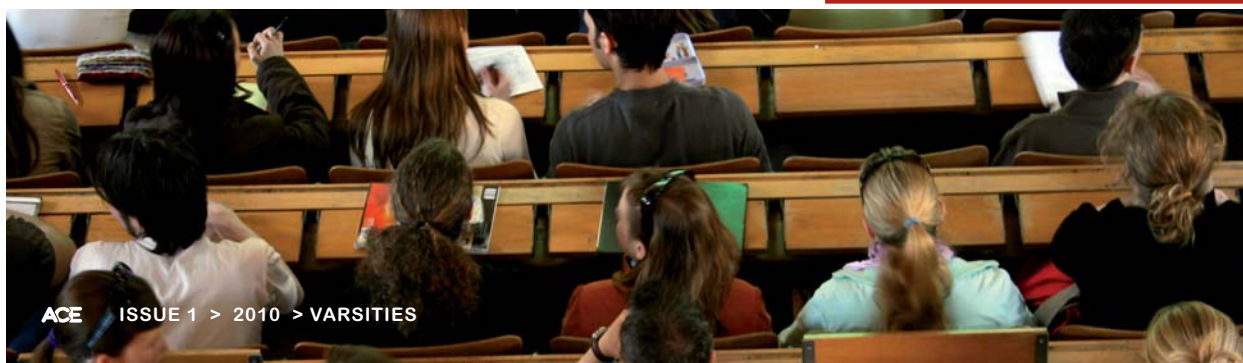

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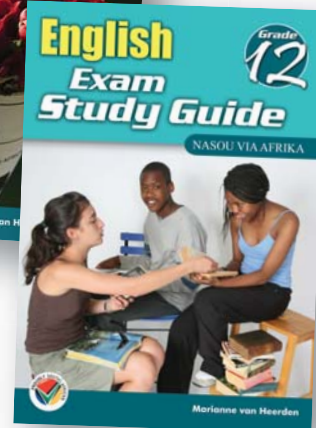
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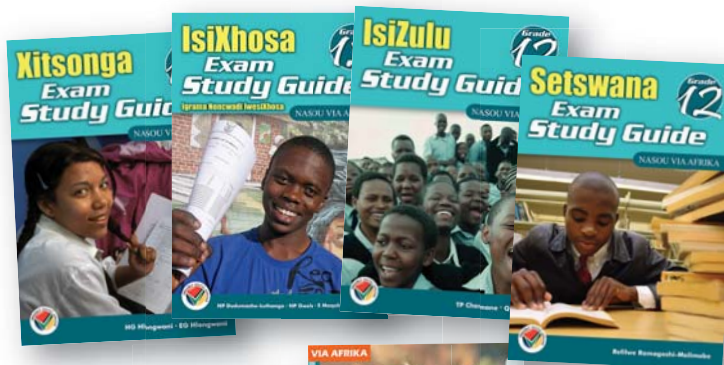
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ACE YOUR APPLICATION

Before you start filling out that application form, make sure you've given some thought as to what course you want to pursue, have all the supporting documents ready and know exactly when the deadline for submission is. Now that that's been dealt with, let's do this!

Remember when applying for varsity admission, you are basically selling yourself. Also note that you cannot submit your application electronically if you have already submitted a hard copy to the institution. One submission is more than enough to get you access to the varsity.

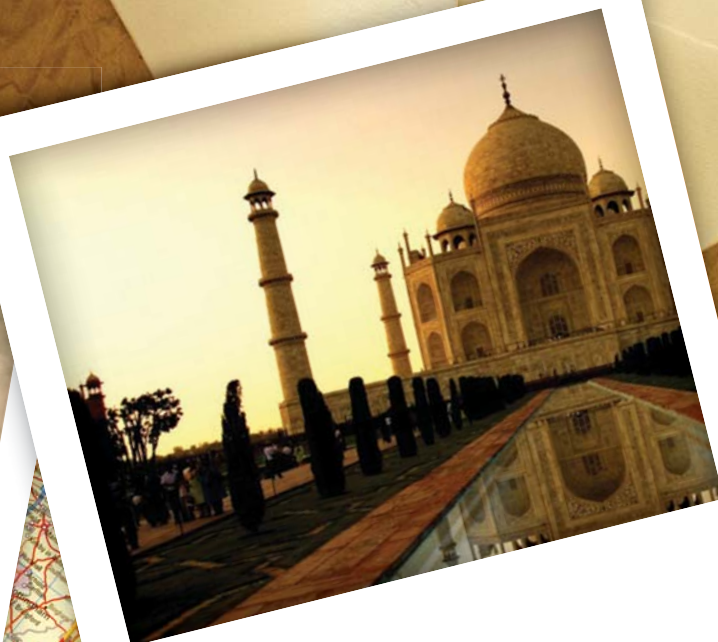

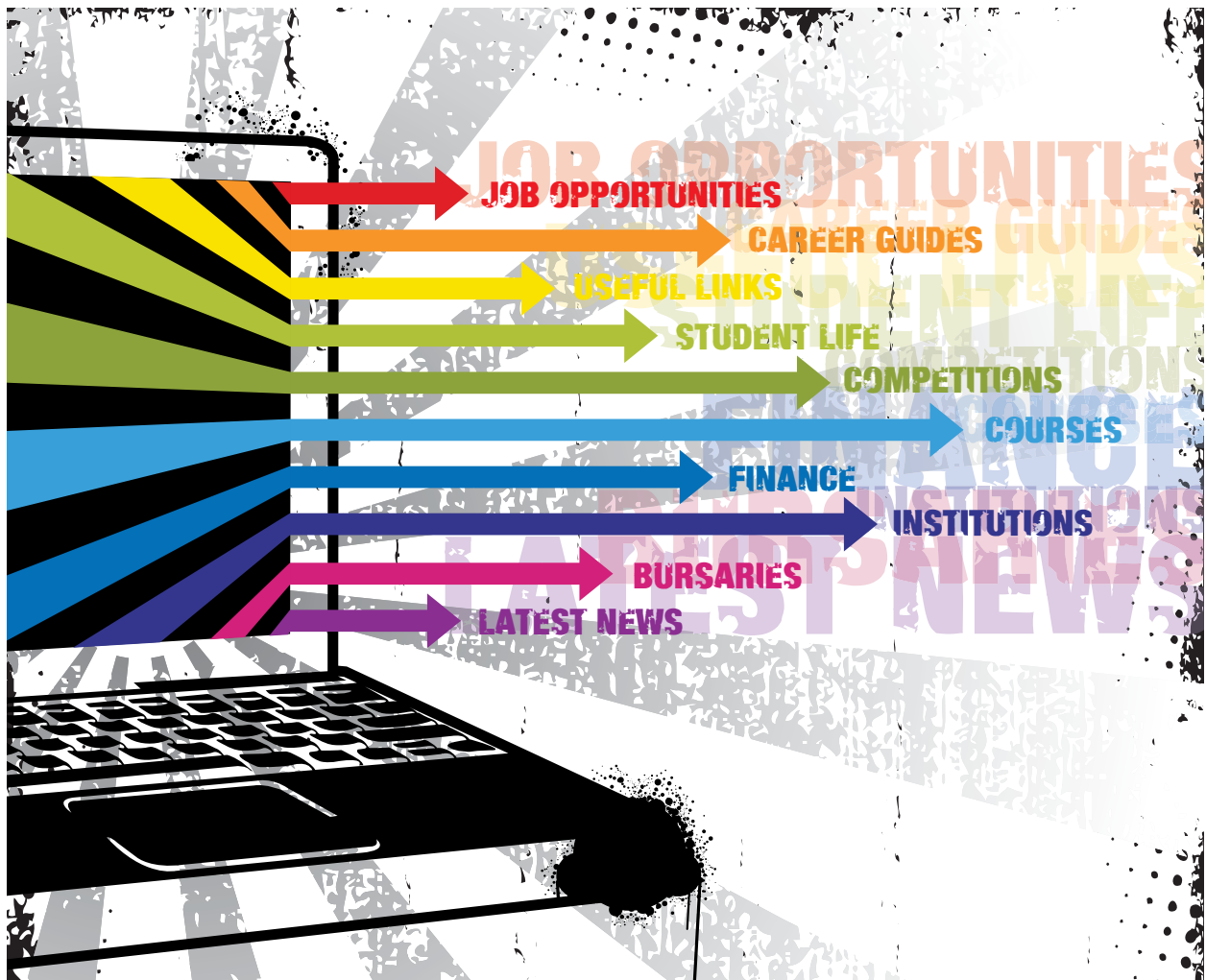


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
